

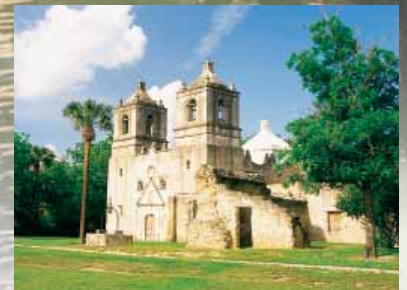

The San Antonio International Airport is approximately 8 miles from the Grand Hyatt San Antonio and the Downtown area. The airport is located at the juncture of NE Loop 410 and Hwy 281 N. with easy access to and from the interstate, and is open 24 hours a day.

To reach the airport from the hotel, exit right onto Market Street. Veer left to I-37 North. Follow I-37 North (merges with Highway 281 North) to the San Antonio International Airport exit (approximately 8 miles) from airport to hotel.

History of Hotel Emma

The hotel building was originally Pearl’s Brewhouse, built in 1894 and a San Antonio landmark ever since. The building was designed by Chicago architect August Maritzen in the Second Empire style. Maritzen specialized in breweries, designing more than eighty in the US, Canada and South Africa.

The Comeback

In 2002, Silver Ventures purchased the property and began the conscientious renovation and adaptive reuse process that has created today’s Pearl, a vibrant culinary and cultural village.



WHAT IS PEARL?

Pearl is a neighborhood and like all great neighborhoods it has a rich history that is added to and upheld by the many people who have ties to the place - the buildings, the river, the brewery since it was founded in 1881. Pearl is also a place where we like to get together – to share meals, to learn, to work, to live. With fifteen restaurants and cafes, thirteen retailers and eighteen resident businesses as well as a twice weekly Farmers Market, this neighborhood is always full of life and activity.

The hotel is named in honor of Emma Koehler, a towering figure in Pearl history. Emma ran the brewery after her husband and Pearl president Otto Koehler died in 1914. She was an ingenious CEO who kept the brewery going during Prohibition by converting operations to dry cleaning and auto repair, and making near beer, ice cream and soda. While other breweries were shutting down, Emma kept her entire workforce employed. She turned over control of the company to a nephew in 1933, but was a formidable presence at the brewery until her death in 1947.

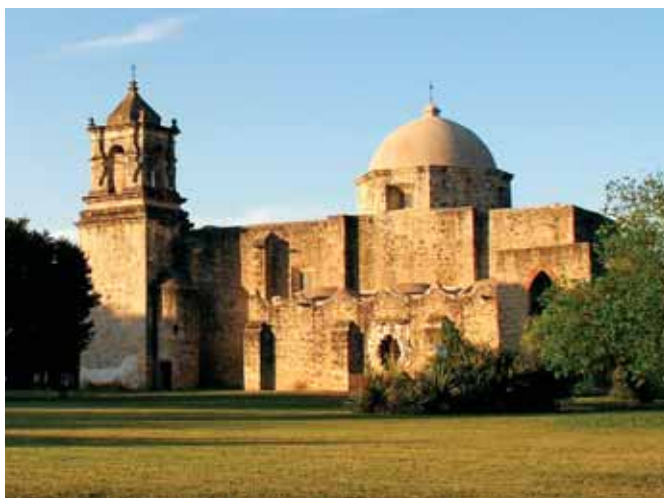


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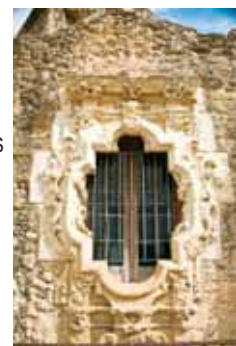

Mission San Jose

Mission San Jose, also known as San Jose y San Miguel de Aguayo, is the largest mission in San Antonio, TX. Due to its size, it was known as the Queen of the Missions. It was established in 1720 and completed in 1782, and it was built with Texas limestone and brightly colored stucco. The mission was surrounded by fields and had livestock, as well as its own gristmill and granary, which have been preserved. Spanish missions weren't just churches, but communities with the church as the main focus. At its height, Mission San Jose provided sanctuary and a social and cultural community for more than 300 Indians.

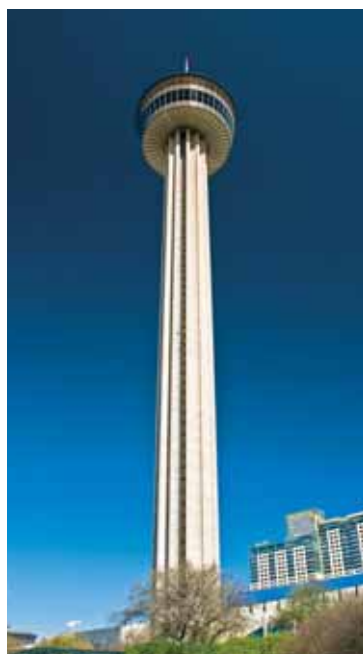


The Alamo

The Alamo is one of the most famous sites in US history, forever linked to the 13-day siege in 1836 that ended with the deaths of defenders James Bowie, William Travis and Davy Crockett. The 18th-century Mission San Antonio de Valero complex became known as the Alamo after it was fortified by Mexican soldiers.

After the events of the 1830s, the Alamo's semi-ruined buildings were used as a garrison and storehouse. Over the past 100 years, the Alamo has been restored and now receives more than 2.5 million visitors a year.

Tour the chapel and barracks, small museum, diorama and gardens to learn more about the Alamo and early-Texan history.



Tower of the Americas

Located in the center of HemisFair Park, this 750-foot tall tower offers one of the best aerial views of San Antonio in the city as well as a variety of experiences. First there is the Flags Over Texas Observation Deck, which allows you a bird's-eye view of iconic sites – either through the telescope or by using photographs on the deck floor that show you where to find specific buildings and landmarks.

There is also a 4D Theater Ride, "Skies Over Texas." The interactive ride takes you on a sensory journey through the state to watch NASA astronauts train at the Johnson Space Center in Houston, attend a local football game, view horses running in the wild and visit some of San Antonio's most important attractions.

For an ambient dining experience, head to their 360-degree rotating restaurant, Chart House Restaurant.

A Legendary Venue in the Heart of San Antonio

Sunset Station, the “Crown Jewel” of San Antonio with its gold leaf vaulted ceilings, majestic grand staircase, beautiful stained glass windows, outdoor terraced courtyard, and a variety of entertainment venues is a stunning backdrop for our opening reception.

Known as “the Building of 1000 Lights,” Sunset Station is a National Historic Landmark that has been restored to its original grandeur to provide an evening of Texas sophistication and San Antonio elegance.

It was designed by Southern Pacific Railroad’s architect Daniel J. Patterson in the Spanish Mission Revival style, and built in 1902. The train station was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1975.

There is even a preserved 2-8-2 Baldwin “Mikado” steam locomotive that had belonged to the Southern Pacific railroad. It was donated to the City of San Antonio at the end of its service life in 1956.

King William Historic District

A sprawling 25 blocks of downtown San Antonio is distinguished as the historic King William District. On the south bank of the San Antonio River, 19th century residences have been preserved and often reincarnated into cafes, art galleries, museums and shops. In the late 1800s, the King William District was the most elegant residential area in the city. Prominent German merchants originally settled this district and brought with them a distinct architectural style. It was zoned as the state's first historic district, and remains a fashionable neighborhood.



The Guenther House

In 1848, a twenty-three-year-old apprentice millwright boarded Europe bound for America. His name was Carl Hilmar Guenther. In America, Guenther had found that "You seize the opportunity that presents itself." In 1858 Guenther decided to close his original mill and relocate his business on the more powerful San Antonio River. He purchased seven and three quarter acres of land just below the center of the city.

In 1860, Guenther began to build a home for his family. Stones were quarried from an area near what is now the San Antonio Zoo for a single-story residence. The mill prospered. Building expansions took place over the years and Guenther's Mill was renamed Pioneer Flour Mills in 1898.

In 1902 Erhard Guenther, Hilmar's youngest son, became president of Pioneer Flour Mills. He also undertook a major remodeling of the family home. The changes that he made gave The Guenther House the look it has today. The restaurant encompasses the original kitchen, tea room, dining room and the outdoor arbor areas of the Guenther House.

Institute of Texan Cultures

Exhibits and collections at the Institute of Texan Cultures share and interpret the rich cultural tapestry that makes this state what it is today. Six Flags Fiesta Texas

A variety of thrill rides, family rides, and events make Six Flags the perfect stop on your Texas vacation. A day of relaxation, excitement, and entertainment fits perfectly into your Lone Star vacation plans. Six Flags Fiesta Texas hosts fun activities for young and old, whether you are brave and bold or a little more laid-back. Launch yourself in a capsule of excitement on Bahama Blaster, take a wet and wild turn on Big Bender, and test your nerve on Blowout, a classic body slide. Fuel up at any of the various dining locations throughout the park. Leave with stories of adventure, racing times to brag about, and a camera full of wild pictures.



Market Square - El Mercado

The rich culture of San Antonio abounds throughout the plazas of Market Square. A three-block outdoor plaza lined with restaurants, shops and produce stands near San Antonio's city center, Market Square is the largest Mexican market in the U.S. It is one of America's top -ten outdoor markets according to Frommer's. Dozens of shops sell everything from hand-embroidered dresses to leather belts. Market Square's working artists, musicians, dancers and major cultural events give it a rich and lively cultural atmosphere. Visitors browse through 32 shops at "El Mercado," and 80 specialty shops in the Farmers Market Plaza. Market Square is also the scene of many Hispanic festivals where food and beverage booths spring up alongside Guadalajara lamps while the sounds of mariachi music blends with the excitement of Mexican dances.
